
The Report of the 23rd Pupils' History Competition for the Academic Year 2021/2022 Organised by the Estonian History and Civics Teachers' Associations for the Prizes of the President of the Republic of Estonia

"SIGNS OF the TIME - TIME, PLACE, HUMAN"

On May 15, 2022, were announced the results of the 23rd student historical research competition "Signs of the time - time, place, human" in the hall of the Ministry of Education and Research in Tartu.

Competition was concluded with 49 studies (6 basic school and 30 high school students, 13 entries in the creative category). This year there was one work written in Russian. Compared to the previous year, the number of jobs received was slightly lower. We hope that there will be more research again next year!

The attached map shows from which corners of Estonia the research papers were sent this year.



The jury awarded the first three places in basic school and the best six in upper secondary school, but the first place was not awarded this year. The top three of both ages received a cash prize from the President's Cultural Foundation.

The best creative works also received a financial award from the Estonian History and Civics Teachers' Associations. In both categories of the competition, the jury awarded a total of 18 book prizes, which are accompanied by a letter of thanks from the president to both the student and the tutor. 16 research papers received a letter of thanks from the Estonian History and Civics Teachers' Associations

The research was evaluated by the chairman of the jury: Chairman Eero Medijainen (Professor of Recent History at the University of Tartu), Anu Järs (Research Curator of the Estonian National Museum), Anu Raudsepp (Associate Professor of History of Tartu University) and Andres Andresen (Associate Professor of Modern Estonia at the University of Tartu). The creative work was judged by the jury: Heivi Truu (Otepää Gymnasium, teacher of history and social studies), Pille Rohtla (Audentes Private School, history teacher).

Andres Andresen, a member of the research jury, stated that since the general theme of the competition was formulated quite broadly, it included works dedicated to a wide variety of individual issues. After all, it is a prerequisite for any event and process that has taken place in history that it takes place at a certain time, in a certain geographical place, and that human activity relates to it. Thus, all the submitted works perfectly corresponded to the general theme of the competition work "Signs of the times - time, place, human".

Basic school students studied the living environment of coastal Swedes, the history of the family and surname, farm, and personal history. The original topic was the study of the school garden, which has been mentioned here and there in Estonian history, but which has not been discussed in detail.

At the upper secondary school level, where there were more works, the thematic diversity was also wider. For example, the topic of the victims of communism, the history of the place from several angles, and the history of various institutions and individuals were discussed. Monuments, insignia, cyber, military, and agricultural issues were also studied.

This year we can highlight the greater use of materials from historical archives. Various other sources have been used in the research, including family archive data, photographs and correspondence, oral sources, interviews and questionnaires.
