### COGAN PRIMARY SCHOOL Vale of Glamorgan

### Title: Cardiff and Barry Docks: Their Hidden Floral Secrets

This was an innovative and interesting project that explored a little-known aspect of local history.

Inspired by a learning walk at Barry Docks the children took an interest in the work of local herbologist Royston Smith. In the 1930s Smith found exotic plants growing naturally in and around Cardiff and Barry Docks and suggested that these plants that were native to the Caribbean and parts of Asia and Africa had been brought to south Wales by ships that had traded with these distant lands.

Pupils produced maps showing the routes that the ships would have taken and compared the docks at that time with the docks today. They worked closely with a local artist to produce artwork using a range of mediums to capture their interest in the herbologist's findings. Their work was then displayed at the Turner House Gallery in Penarth. Pupils also interviewed Smith's granddaughter to find out more about his discoveries.

### Title: Famous People in Wales

Pupils learned about people and characters from Wales. Class research was undertaken on Roald Dahl and they enjoyed listening to some of his stories. Everyone enjoyed a session with Mr Urdd and the whole class produced an energetic rendition of 'Hei Mistar Urdd'.

Individuals identified and produced work on their own chosen Welsh icons such as sports stars Gareth Bale and Natasha Harding and entertainers such as Charlotte Church, Catherine Zeta Jones and Tom Jones. They followed up by finding out about more local examples that were important to them. They shadowed their local choir and interviewed a member and saw how important that the choir was to their community. They went on to make pledges to make their locality and Wales a better place to live in. Well-being was a central feature of their project and featured strongly in their performances.

### YSGOL LLANNON Carmarthenshire

### Title: Beth yw Cymru i mi? - What is Wales to me?

In this project, the pupils considered the question 'What is Wales to me?' by learning about a number of notable Welsh individuals, including Santes Dwynwen, Mari Jones and her Bible, and Williams Pantycelyn. The children learned more about hymns by listening to examples and learning to sing a hymn. The centenary celebrations of the Urdd were incorporated into the work, as the children created decorations for the classroom and performed Mr Urdd's song. There were a number of opportunities to perform and enjoy music as part of this project, with pupils participating in a virtual concert for St David's Day.

It is clear that the children enjoyed this project, and that they were given opportunities to evaluate and use their knowledge by creating Top Trumps cards to sell, and by selecting their own symbols to create badges encouraging others to speak Welsh.

### TREF Y RHYG PRIMARY SCHOOL Rhondda Cynon Taf

Title: Homes and Castles in Wales

The Homes and Castles project by Tref y Rhyg Primary was an impressive attempt at a cross curricular activity based on castles, one of the most familiar aspects of Welsh heritage. By contrasting the pupils' own homes with the medieval castle, the project created a personal understanding of change over time and increased awareness of their own community. The exploration of building materials and different elements of the castle prompted thought about the reasons why Welsh castles look like they do. The introduction of a Welsh knight character personified the experience and led to role playing and scenario development focussed on an impressive castle model. Research on the Internet enabled analysis of online security and extended the knowledge of the subject to the whole of Wales. Undertaken in a year when physical visits were not possible, the project prompted an interest in Welsh heritage amongst these young learners.



### RHWS PRIMARY SCHOOL Vale of Glamorgan

### Title: Who Are We As A Nation? - Pwy Ydyn Ni Fel Cenedl?

This project started with a big question - Who are we as a nation? Each year group then chose an area of study linked to a heritage site, a significant historical event, or the local area to investigate this question. Development of enquiry skills was a strong part of this project and was evident in each year group in an age-appropriate way. Each individual learner designed a mini enquiry which contributed to investigating their big question. The reception class for instance decided to explore their own locality and concluded that we are houses and buildings connected by transport. Year four chose to study Wales' industrial past and concluded that we are enterprising and value human rights. Several experts were invited into the school to be interviewed. The pupils asked excellent questions. They showed empathy whilst discussing sensitive subjects such as the Aberfan disaster and the flooding of Tryweryn and reached well thought through conclusions. Every child in the school made a valuable contribution to this project.

### TY'N Y WERN PRIMARY Caerphilly

Title: Taith Trwy Trethomas

'Taith trwy Trethomas' was a whole school project which allowed pupils to explore and celebrate their local heritage. They researched different buildings and elements of their locality, discovered interesting stories and facts and presented these on film. They gathered evidence from a number of sources – past and present maps, school logbooks, interviews with family members.

The presentations suggest that pupils had a depth of knowledge, really enjoyed discovering about their local area and were passionate about sharing with the wider community. They have created a tour of the village with eight locations where QR codes have been placed. Residents can access the presentations as they walk around the village. The pupils had also measured the distance in steps between the different locations to encourage people to keep healthy as they walk around.

### CWMCLYDACH PRIMARY SCHOOL Rhondda Cynon Taf

### Title: Family Friendship and Fun: The Changing Face of Childhood in Clydach Vale

Pupils chose to research several aspects of children's lives in the past, such as playground games, clothing, cartoons on TV, party food, and the development of technology. They engaged enthusiastically with a topic which was immediately relevant to them and to their families.

Each year group investigated a different decade, with the youngest looking at the 2000s, reception/Y1 the 1990s, Y1/2 the 1980s etc. They produced feedback in the form of video recordings and photographic evidence of an appropriate standard for their age. They worked independently and as part of a group especially when presenting their findings.

Pupils also investigated the materials that games and toys were made out of, for example a Rubik cube and a 'Hungry Hippo'.

They discussed their findings and made links to the modern day. They discovered that many of the games that their parents and grandparents played and enjoyed are still a part of children's lives today.

### DARRAN PARK PRIMARY SCHOOL Rhondda Cynon Taf

Title: Our Wonderful World

The project focused on the rôle industry and technology play in people's lives: a significant issue in Wales as well as in the locality of the school. Pupils considered how their community had changed over time because of the impact of changes in technology affecting those industries which had shaped the area, especially the coal industry and the railways. They themselves used contemporary digital technology to present their evidence-based findings.

The project was clearly enquiry based, with each class having developed their own enquiry question based on the central whole school question, and pupils made appropriate reference to the evidence on which their findings were based. They were able both to develop research skills and communicate their findings across a range of different contexts and media. The evidence presented shows that pupils were able to apply their knowledge and understanding creatively, and to co-operate effectively with others.

### YSGOL CARREGHOFA Powys

### Title: Happy Together, Reaching High For 110 Years

This project looked at the past 110 ten years in Llanymynech and Carreghofa School. The project developed pupils' understanding of their community's heritage. It was a well-researched project that enthused its participants.

Reception and Year 1 pupils effectively compared and contrasted old photographs of the school with the building today.

Each school year investigated different aspects of school life. Personal memories of school life were collected from former pupils and interviews with family members. They researched the past occupations of local people and discovered that most were employed in agriculture.

Year 6 pupils researched a train crash that happened in Llanymynech in 1908 using newspaper articles and other sources. They re-enacted the train crash and conducted their own role play enquiry into the causes of the crash to consider whether it was a very tired driver who was at fault.

They hope to publish a book of memories.

### YSGOL PENBOYR Carmarthenshire

### Title: Llannau'r Filltir Sgwar - The Square Mile

This project, Llannau'r Filltir Sgwar took places of worship within the school's locality as a starting point. Different classes researched different buildings, collecting information from a number of sources. The discrepancy found between different sources led them to question the reliability of the information they found. They made lots of visits, spoke to many people outside the school such as ministers and guides and visited St Fagans.

Pupils developed their enquiry and research skills and there was very strong evidence of wider elements of learning. Extensive use was made of technology and it was good to see skills such as numeracy and ICT being integrated seamlessly into a study of local heritage and history. These different elements were brought together on a website.

A mock eco-friendly wedding at the end of the project was an opportunity for the whole school to celebrate their learning.

### ST ILLTYD'S ROMAN CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL Merthyr Tydfil

### Title: Digging Deep in to Dowlais

The focus of the project was the Parish's 175th anniversary, but while the church and the parish were central to the work, wider links were made with the area's rich heritage. Opportunities were taken to undertake visits which enabled the learners to set their own cynefin in a wider context, raising their awareness of local and Welsh heritage issues.

Pupils applied their knowledge to create timelines and information sheets. Evidence chosen had an emphasis on 'real life authentic experiences' which are available in various reports and made an impact on the pupils.

Good use was made of outside agencies such as the library and local historians, and the work was further enriched by visits to local landmarks, enabling learners to understand the historical context of their community and local buildings. The focus of these visits was adapted to the age-group involved.

### ST. MARY'S ROMAN CATHOLIC PRIMARY SCHOOL Merthyr Tydfil

Title: Made in Merthyr

The focus of the project was the raising of pupil's awareness of their locality. All year groups, over 200 pupils, fully participated and engaged with the project completing age-appropriate tasks. Notable people who were 'made in Merthyr' or helped to 'make Merthyr' were investigated across the age range, including key figures such as Laura Ashley, Joseph Parry and Richard Trevithick. Upper KS2 looked at tourism and landmarks in Merthyr.

Pupils learning was enhanced by visits to local historical sites and by visits of local historians to the school. Opportunities were given for the development of a vast range of wider skills, such as making effective use of research techniques, collaborative working and the development of oral skills.

Pupil outcomes included video recordings, photographs, written work, graphs and art work. The use of ICT was evident and a key success of the project throughout with spreadsheets, charts, Minecraft and the development of their own websites by Y6.

### DERI PRIMARY SCHOOL Caerphilly

Title: Memories of Ysgwyddgwyn

The school took a fresh approach to this topic, based on a comment that Ysgwyddgwyn chapel, which recently closed, was 'a well-loved shape on the Deri skyline'. This led to consideration of the landscape around the chapel as well as of the history of the chapel itself, and also to the work of a contemporary Welsh artist, Martyn Evans. One of his colourful and idiosyncratic paintings is of a chapel very similar to Ysgwyddgwyn, and his vision of the valley landscape inspired the pupils' lively artwork.

The focus of the project was art and the local landscape, but pupils used a range of written, visual and oral evidence, including interviewing members of the community, to find out about the chapel and its role in the community. Pupils had clearly engaged with the project, which had a direct relevance for them all, and with the accounts they had gathered of chapel activities.

# ST CHAD'S CHURCH IN WALES VOLUNTARY AIDED PRIMARY SCHOOL, HANMER Wrexham

### Title: Ein Pentref, Ein Cynefin

Inspired by the Welsh poet R S Thomas who was a curate at St Chad's Church between 1940-1942, Ein Pentref, Ein Cynefin took R S Thomas' poem 'The Village' and presented it in a personal and contemporary way.

Each year group focussed on different aspects of the locality such as their school, local shops, the police house, the church and the Hanmer family. They wrote and performed a poem on that theme, informed by their own knowledge and understanding of their locality. The pupil's enthusiasm was evident and was reflected in their performances which reflected their love of their community, local heritage, village and their Cynefin.

The story of Santes Dwynwen led to the production of St. Dwynwen cards and portraits, the making of love spoons, the baking of hearts and the writing of songs and poems.

### YSGOL GYNRADD GYMRAEG LLWYNCELYN Rhondda Cynon Taf

Title: Cymru Pawb: Chwalu Ffiniau

– Everyone's Wales: Breaking Boundaries

This theme gave the pupils an opportunity to explore their own identity and heritage in Cwm Rhondda through local research, a parent questionnaire and studying the 2011 census, before reaching out to discover different cultures in Butetown and by inviting visitors from different backgrounds into the school. After exchanging emails with the pupils of Mount Stuart School a visit was arranged and this visit had far-reaching effects on both. An understanding of concepts such as nationhood, cultures and identity was developed through a variety of media: music, art, dance, literacy, numeracy, photography and performance. The classroom exhibition and the scrap books contained detailed information about the pupils' direct involvement with this theme. The pupils have shared the project with local headteachers, their families and the community. The project has taught the pupils that Wales belongs to everyone and that it is possible to shatter borders. A pioneering, ambitious project.

Gelli Primary School's study of 'Black Gold' was original and clearly both motivated and excited the pupils leading to excellent creative outcomes. They not only grasped that coal mining was an integral part of their local heritage but also understood the current and future issues linked to the coal industry. They used a wide range of sources, which they examined critically, to gain valuable knowledge not just on mining in general, but the social and environmental struggles this brought. They gained sufficient knowledge to enable them to question their local MP on the issues of coal tips near their school.

Pupils interpreted their knowledge into a creative performance using their digital skills to produce news reports and animations about the past and future in Gelli. By participating in the project, they were able to become ethical informed citizens of the world by looking into workers' rights and global warming.

### FOCHRIW PRIMARY SCHOOL Caerphilly

Title: The Lost Village of Penybanc

This project took on the challenge of discovering more about the 'lost' village of Penybanc in the Darran Valley.

There was a real effort by the school to engage with the 'historical enquiry' throughout the project, with the pupils taking part in workshops as a class and with 'experts' to develop questions and lines of enquiry. The pupils utilised a wide range of sources including: oral histories, historic maps, census records, newspaper articles, historical journals and photographs. They discussed themes of source 'validity' and 'reliability'. They gained an excellent understanding of the wider history of the Darran Valley.

The topic saw the pupils develop their knowledge and real sense of pride in their community. Their desire to commemorate the location of Penybanc with a plaque so that others will share in their knowledge is to be commended.

The sense of discovery and enthusiasm was evident throughout, and the judges were impressed by the dedication of the pupils in their historical enquiries and ambition to share what they had learned.

## YSGOL GYMRAEG CAERFFILI Caerphilly

Title: Alfred Russel Wallace

This project addressed a gap in the market – online resources in the Welsh language about Alfred Russel Wallace – a man of many talents, an explorer, naturalist, and anthropologist - known mainly for his revolutionary idea of evolution by natural selection, later published by Darwin. The pupils were given opportunities to develop both historical and wider skills and used a variety of sources to research Wallace's life. They placed their knowledge in the context of the Victorian era.

These ambitious, capable pupils produced a colourful and inspiring Welsh language animation about Wallace's life, cataloguing his discoveries and ideas on the environment so relevant to today's society. Their study of Wallace and those areas that he explored in the Amazon and Indonesia, has inspired them to become champions of the environment. They have established an environmental club which has planted trees, wild flowers and established nesting boxes and insect boxes in the school grounds.

### Title: War and Bravery - The Swansea Three-night Blitz

This project, which had an emphasis on the expressive arts, undoubtedly excited the children of Morriston Primary and provided an experience which will remain with them for years to come.

Working with a team of professionals, the pupils learned about the three- night Swansea Blitz by studying and discussing a range of photographs and listening to the author, Manon Eames, reading from her work on the topic. They were encouraged to consider the role of women in terms of food, rationing and generally looking after the needs of the family.

Pupils demonstrated their empathy for the families who lived through those times, by the writing and performing of poetry, playscripts and song.

In a related activity pupils visited the local Memorial Park, where they helped to weed the area and prepared a planter to represent the school.

### Title: Captain William Davies Evans

Ysgol Casblaidd highlighted the successes of Captain William Davies Evans who was born and bred in Wolf's Castle. As he was relatively unknown there was a lack of information about him, and the pupils showed perseverance in researching various sources that included materials received from the Captain's descendants. Due to their determination the children were able to gather enough information to present a complete portrait of the Captain's life, together with explanations about his inventions; a tricolour lighting system to protect ships at sea, and a chess 'opening' officially recognised as the "Evans Gambit". The pupils showed great pride in the successes of the seaman from Wolf's Castle, and as well as celebrating his life by creating a mural on a school wall, they ensured that future generations will be aware of Evans's achievements by collaborating with St Dogwells Community Council to place a plaque locally to commemorate them.

### Title: Cymru, Gwlad y Gân

This project, with a multi-cultural class in which fifteen different languages were spoken, focussed on the relationship between Wales and song/music.

The pupils worked independently and collaboratively, looking at a range of music genre and determining how music played, and continues to play, its part in so many aspects of Welsh life, including sport, the community and society in general. Its effect on morale and wellbeing was noted.

Pupils carried out Internet research and shared their findings with their peers. They gained additional information from interviewing the stage manager of the Welsh National Opera and a member of Only Boys Aloud.

Welsh songs and a simple folk dance were learnt and performed. Judges felt that the children's use of Welsh should be commended.

### TREORCHY PRIMARY SCHOOL Rhondda Cynon Taf

### Title: Curiosities of Cymru

The project focused on legends and myths from within the locality of the school and from the recent past. Pupils used the idea of "fake news" to question the reliability of sources and evidence for the events they were researching. Working in groups, they researched the story of two local boxers who were passengers on the Titanic and drowned in the tragedy and aspects of the Tonypandy Riots. They shared their findings with other groups.

In the course of the project pupils used photographs of the locality taken in the early twentieth century and compared them with the same locations today. They also found out about rights acquired by coal miners, including improved working conditions and the Rights of the Child today.

### Title: Hair Raising History

This project focussed on changing hairstyles during the twentieth and twenty first centuries and changes in appliances used to style hair. Pupils used the local library and the Internet for their research and produced timelines to illustrate the changes. They worked with three experts to extend their knowledge and to produce creative outcomes – a scientist, a drama coach and an artist. The drama coach helped pupils explore culture and diversity through oracy, drama and written work whilst the artist helped them create art work relating to different hairstyles.

The pupils presented their work to the whole school at an assembly.

### YSGOL BRO PEDR Ceredigion

Title: Balchder Bro, Ein Cynefin
- Pride in Our Area, Our Cynefin

The focus of this innovative project was to create a new unit of work for year 7 pupils to match the requirements of the new Curriculum. The terms work focused on four lines of inquiry - Is Lampeter a small town with a big story? A building is only four walls, is this fair? Does the town have a future? The town is nothing without people? It is clear through the unit of work that the school has actively integrated the humanities subjects of History, Geography, Business, Sociology and Religious Education together in order to develop 'Balchder Bro' 'a sense of pride in the community' amongst the pupils. A wealth of material was gained by researching the town's buildings, people and stories. The school used various methods of inquiry and it was pleasing to see pupils record what they had discovered through creative writing, classroom murals / mosaics, a website on Google Sites and Minecraft. The 'pride' the pupils felt towards their 'cynefin' came out clearly in the video and it was a great pleasure to see the enthusiasm of the pupils.

## Title: Hanes Menywod o Gymru a Swffragetiaid o Gaerdydd – The history of Welsh women and suffragettes from Cardiff

A year 8 and 9 research project into the history of Welsh women and suffragettes from Cardiff. The pupils created their own website on the project for easy sharing with other pupils and the wider community. The teachers have decided to use the information pupils have gathered to create a unit of work for Year 7 pupils coming into the school in September as part of their new unit of work for the new Curriculum for Wales which will allow pupils to learn about local history and the history of the suffragette campaign in Wales. The obvious strength of this work is that so much of the historical research has been done by the pupils themselves. It is also pleasing to note that the pupils have had the opportunity to develop their ICT skills through the use of all kinds of digital websites such as Canva and Slides Carnival to develop their website image.

### DYFFRYN TAF COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL Carmarthenshire

### Title: How big a deal was Whitland Abbey?

It was interesting to see the school select a historical site which had been previously just part of the environment, somewhere cross-country running took place — the pupils were focussed on discovering as much information as possible to establish whether Whitland Abbey was a 'big deal' and to build a deeper sense of 'cynefin'. They undertook wideranging research into the Abbey's history and completed a variety of tasks to come to their conclusion. Pupils looked at the Abbey in terms of its religious significance. Study of the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury with Gerald of Wales led them to consider the Church's attitude to war; they also discussed whether there was such a thing as a 'just war' and whether it was important to preserve historical sites. Commemorative plates were made to celebrate Gerald's visit and a range of written tasks identified their opinions. In addition, they spoke to the nuns and to officials organising the 'Open Doors' Day. Photographs indicate pupil enjoyment on that day.

Title: Merched Beca - The Rebecca Riots

Four pupils in year 9 are part of a history club. They meet outside lessons and have established links with another Welsh Medium school, Ysgol Gwynllyw to develop a project on Merched Beca, the Rebecca Riots. They received research questions from Gwynllyw pupils and worked to produce an attractive wall display and video detailing the outcomes of their research. They have developed a good level of detailed and accurate information on Merched Beca. In turn Gwendraeth pupils submitted questions on the Newport Riots and the Chartist movement to Ysgol Gwynllyw pupils for them to research. Though at a very early phase, this is an interesting approach, to have pupils in one school working collabratively in partnership with pupils in another school as a means of consolidating learning. The Rebecca Riots are a significant historical event which had a particular impact in West Wales.

### YSGOL GYFUN GWYNLLYW Torfaen

Title: Terfysg Casnewydd - Newport Riots

Fifteen year 8 pupils are members of a history club who meet outside lesson time. They have linked with another Welsh Medium school in Carmarthenshire, Ysgol Maes Y Gwendraeth to develop a project on the Newport Riots and the Chartist movement. They received questions from pupils in the partner school on this theme whilst Gwynllyw pupils submitted questions on the Rebecca Riots to Gwendraeth pupils. Although at a very early phase, this is an interesting approach, to have pupils in one school working collaboratively in partnership with pupils in another school as a means of consolidating learning. Pupils appear well motivated and have developed an appropriate level of knowledge on this topic for their age and ability. They are aware of the significance of the Newport Riots and the Chartist movement in developing democracy in Wales. Pupils have developed appropriate IT skills and have produced a video and, though incomplete, are working on a website to share their work more widely.

### YSGOL PEN Y BRYN Swansea

Title: Swansea Copperopolis

The judges were very impressed with the levels of engagement and motivation shown by all pupils in their video. The project had clearly excited them all. Pupils at all key stages communicated their detailed knowledge very effectively. They made strong connections between the stages of copper production and the range of uses of copper products and noted the connections between copper and their locality, such as in the establishment of Morriston by John Morris to house his workers. KS5 pupils used the experiences of sailors such as the Cape Horners and Benjamin Davies to write sea shanties and make a recording for sale. (The proceeds from which went to the Red Cross for Ukraine). KS4 pupils made a Minecraft reconstruction. Overall, this was a well-crafted project that offered all pupils rich, multi-layered and multi-sensory experiences that enabled them all to build significant knowledge and skills.

### Title: Does unman yn debyg i Lanelli! There is nowhere like Llanelli!

Ysgol Heol Goffa's project interpreted heritage in a wide sense to give all pupils immersive experiences of the heritage and culture of their locality. Judges could see in the video the development of communication skills for all pupils, which was clearly a particular focus. They enjoyed the multi-sensory approaches taken in the project. They created collages, made bird boxes, created Welsh music, designed a Llanelli heritage trail, wrote fact files of Welsh rugby players, and even fed calves and had a go at sitting in a tractor at a local farm. It was particularly impressive that the project developed authentic experiences for the pupils through visits and building a range of solid community links within their locality, such as with the local library, wildlife rangers at a local reservoir and a local farm.

### YSGOL BRYN DERW Newport

Title: Cestyll Cymru

This whole school project focused on multiple aspects of castles. Some pupils developed their creative and problem-solving skills through modelling and building castles. Others developed their communication skills, working together on research. Pupils enjoyed role play to think about who might live in a castle, and designed their own crowns to wear. Older pupils used technology to explore castles through images and sensory stories and used a range of new vocabulary to write their own stories of castles. Pupils enjoyed recalling castles that they knew the names of, or that they had visited with parents before, and the exhibition of class castles from the focus week was a 'hit'. Judges were particularly impressed with the engagement of all the pupils in the project and the extent to which activities and outcomes were collaborative and developed independence skills (a vital outcome of the project).






EUSTORY is an informal network of non-governmental organisations that conduct research-based history competitions for young people in Europe. The network was initiated by the Körber Foundation in Germany and it connects organisations in 28 countries.

The Welsh Heritage Schools' Initiative is a member and is the only member from the UK. Other countries represented include Germany, Ireland, Georgia, Israel, Portugal, Poland, Estonia, Slovenia, Switzerland and Italy.

For the WHSI EUSTORY history prize, students in Y12 and Y13 have been invited to submit an individual project, linked to Welsh heritage and based on research, analysis and evaluation.

The winner receive a monetary prize for themselves and their school and in addition are eligible to apply for the annual EUSTORY youth activities with other young Europeans. Due to current restrictions the EUSTORY programmes will be organised in a virtual format in 2022.
